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University-wide Theme for 2019-2020: Live the Truth in Love: Reverence

At Neumann University we emphasize three aspects of **Reverence**:

- We honor the worth and dignity of each person.
- We celebrate our relationship as sisters and brothers with one another and all creation.
- We create a compassionate, welcoming, and reconciling community.

The Neumann Institute for Franciscan Studies has planned several programs related to the value of Reverence. These programs respond to the recommendations received on past evaluations and the 2018-2019 required institutional effectiveness assessment of the Neumann Institute. In summary, the institutional effectiveness assessment revealed priority for the following type programs:

- Book Studies (This semester's Book Study honors the 800th anniversary of the meeting of St. Francis of Assisi and Sultan Malek al-Kamil and develops the idea of *Reverence as Sacred Encounter*)
- 60-90 minute programs offered multiple times throughout the year (We will offer multiple opportunities to discuss an article by Sr. Mary Beth Ingham, entitled Sacred Encounters: The Heart of Franciscan Education)
- Reverence Reflection Guides for personal use and sharing at regularly scheduled division and unit meetings (A reflection booklet was distributed on Welcome Back Day.)
- Continued focus on learning more about St. Clare of Assisi (We will offer an Advent Evening of reflection and a Lenten Lunch and Learn)
- Continued focus on *Environmental Stewardship* (We have exciting plans for celebrating the 5th Anniversary of the publication of Laudato Si and the 50th Anniversary of *Earth Day*. The NIFS is also collaborating with other University units to increase our efforts to reduce, reuse, and recycle!)
- Promotion of existing online opportunities for education in the Franciscan tradition (See descriptions in this newsletter.)

Loved unconditionally by God, we are invited to love, support, and care for life in all stages, from conception to natural death. We respect diversity in all forms and seek to reconcile divisions of any kind. We promote communications which are meaningful, honest, and inclusive by listening reflectively to one another and encouraging varying points of view.

Book Study on Daring to Cross the Threshold: Francis of Assisi Encounter's Sultan Malek Al-Kamil by Kathleen Warren, OSF

In her article Sacred Encounters: The Heart of Franciscan Education, Sr. Mary Beth Ingham, CSJ says, "There is no better example of (sacred encounter) for me than the inspiring story of Francis of Assisi and the Sultan...In the 'other,' the Sultan, the believer of another faith, Francis sees his brother. Their encounter is sacred. It produces a change in (their) thinking, and in the way (they) look upon the world" (p. 26-27).

In her short book, Sr. Kathy provides insights into the historical, social, and cultural context of the sacred encounter between these two men. In addition, the book offers profound insights into the nature of interpersonal dialogue, barriers to such conversation, and suggestions for creating a climate where every voice is welcomed with reverence.

Meeting St. Clare of Assisi

Over the past few years, many have questioned why we do so little to promote understanding of the place of St. Clare of Assisi in the Franciscan tradition. To respond to this question, we invited Dr. Eileen Flanagan to develop a presentation on *Clare of Assisi and her legacy to the Franciscan world* in March 2019. Evaluations of the Dr. Flanagan's presentation were so positive that we have engaged Dr. Flanagan to offer two presentations this year:



Advent Dinner and Evening of Reflection on December 3, 2019 from 5:15 to 8:00 PM in the Franciscan Spiritual Center on *Clare of Assisi and Advent Prayer: Lectio Divina.*

A description of the presentation follows:

In the Letters to Agnes of Prague, Clare instructs Agnes, a prominent princess who desires to follow the way of life practiced by Clare and her Poor Sisters in San Damiano. Mandated by the papacy to follow the *Rule of Benedict*, Clare integrates Benedictine wisdom, especially the method of *lectio divina*, and shares her own unique approach to *lectio* and *meditatio* with Agnes. Our Advent evening will focus on engaging Clare's graced insights about "gazing" on the medieval mirror, a metaphor "for Him who was placed in a manger and wrapped in tiny garments" (4 LAg 19).

Campus-wide Focus on Environmental Reverence and Stewardship

Care for Creation is an essential commitment in the Franciscan tradition. In 1979, Pope John Paul II named St. Francis of Assisi the patron of those who promote ecology in. In the encyclical Laudato Si: On Care for our Common Home, Pope Francis wrote: "I believe that St. Francis is the example par excellence of care for the vulnerable and of an integral ecology lived out joyfully and authentically." Over the years, Neumann University has demonstrated a strong commitment to care for creation through both education and action. The NIFS has offered programs dedicated to environmental awareness and stewardship during Lent of every year. These programs have included book studies and discussions, prayer services, and presentations by Neumann faculty, staff, and invited guests. Concrete actions have included the installation of several water bottle filling stations in various locations on campus, purchase of distinctive trash and recycling containers, initiation of tray-less meals in the cafeteria to limit food waste, participation in composting efforts through Kitchen Harvest with Linville Orchards, conversion to recyclable containers in the Knights and Crossroads cafes, and more! This past year Vice President for Finance Gene McWilliams invited Amy McDowell, President of Waste Matters, to collaborate with Neumann to examine current waste management practices as the basis for developing and coordinating additional campus- wide efforts to become even more engaged stewards of creation! The 2019-2020 year is an especially appropriate year to intensify efforts on behalf of the environment because we will mark the 5th Anniversary of the publication of Laudato Si and the 50th Anniversary of Earth Day!

To coordinate efforts, a campus-wide Care for Creation Advisory Council is being formed.

The initial organizational meeting of this Council will take place on September 17 from 3 to 4:30 PM

in the Assisi Room of Bachmann Main.

Pastoral Letter on Racism II

In November 2018, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops released a long-awaited Pastoral letter on Racism entitled Open Wide our Hearts: The Enduring Call to Love.

"But racism still profoundly affects our culture, and it has no place in the Christian heart. .'

In February 2019, Father Stephen Thorne offered a presentation on this critical document. Attended by more than 100 faculty, staff, and students, this presentation was so well-received that we have invited Father Thorne to offer a second session in February 2020.
