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Core Assessment 2020-2021

During the 2020-2021 academic year, the focus of Core assessment will be outcomes associated with *Comprehension* and *Compassion*. Courses noted in **Bold** will be involved in assessment!

Comprehension: Think critically, creatively, and analytically

- LO 1.1 Analyze and solve complex problems (TBD)
- LO 1.2 Demonstrate quantitative reasoning (Math Core courses)
- LO 1.3 Demonstrate scientific literacy (Science Core courses)

LO 1.4 Explore the relationship of contemporary and historical events and issues. (History Core

courses)

Compassion: Respect all of creation

LO 4.1 Honor the worth and dignity of each person (Diversity-certified courses)

LO 4.2 Interact respectfully in the local and global community (Courses that include group projects)

LO 4.3 Engage in service to promote the common good (Theology 104 & Service-Learning Core

courses in each major)

LO 4.4 Demonstrate environmental awareness and stewardship (TBD).

Preparing for 2020 – 2021 Core Assessments

Please review the Core assessment plans and the rubrics for <u>Comprehension</u> and <u>Compassion</u>, especially if your course will be included in the assessment process.

As you prepare your syllabus, please make sure to include a **Core Signature Assignment** that invites students to demonstrate mastery of the Core learning outcomes. See Guidelines for developing a Core Signature Assignment in the **May 2019 newsletter.**

Service-Learning 2020-2021 (in the midst of a Pandemic)

As a concrete expression of Neumann's commitment to Service, we have embedded Service-Learning into the curriculum in the first year with a day of service during NeuKnight Prep days and reflection on this service in Theology 104. In addition, every major has identified at least one course which requires students to participate in and reflect upon service.

During the coming academic year, service (like everything else during the pandemic) will look different. Our Campus Ministers are hoping to integrate service in some form during the NeuKnight Prep days. The reflection can take place as usual in Theology 104.

Faculty who teach the major course which includes service-learning should contact Megan Camp to discuss an appropriate service activity that is congruent with the objectives of the course and in compliance with safety standards.

Diversity-certified Courses: An Invitation

In the virtual Town Hall meeting held on June 8, several students spoke of their desire to participate in challenging classroom conversations around racial justice. Diversity-certified courses are designed to provide students with knowledge, skills, and attitudes/values to help them to engage in such conversations. Beginning with the class who entered Neumann in Fall 2019, students must participate in at least one diversity-certified course before they graduate.

The application and rubric for Diversity-certified courses can be found in the Faculty Senate-Faculty Development site within Blackboard. Once on this site, click on the link on the sidebar for *Faculty Development Resources*; then open the folder titled *Diversity-certified courses*.

Members of the Diversity-certified sub-group of the Core Committee are available to discuss applications with faculty members. Once an application is submitted, two members of the Diversity-certified sub-group will review the application and provide feedback. Please contact Sr. Pat Hutchison with questions.
