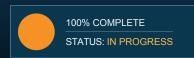

We have not accepted students into the program yet. Once we launch the program, the students (who will all be the teacher of record in their classroom) will apply concepts studies in class in specific ways. Each student will have both a University Supervisor and a Cooperating Teacher. In addition to preand post-observations conferences, the Supervisor will observe in the classroom at least one time per month and will meet with the student (one-on-one and sometimes in small groups) bi-weekly to reflect and discuss progress, questions, etc.

We are in the process of getting Institutional approval to offer this program and hope to bring in students for the 2022-23 academic year. Neumann's programs adhere to the frameworks established by the Pennsylvania Department of Education (PDE). We have not prepared teachers in the programs yet but the program is designed to ensure all students receive training related to child development, pedagogy, assessment, teaching students with disabilities effectively, meeting the needs of LEP students, and being dedicated culturally responsive and sustaining educators. Students must pass the appropriate state-mandated knowledge tests prior to being accepted into the programs. Once the program is launched we will assess the program annually, using signature assignments in courses to assess whether students are meeting the learning outcomes for the program. These learning outcomes overarch PDE standards. In addition to the annual program assessment, faculty will focus course assessments on the PDE standards to ensure students who complete our program are fully prepared. Most course assignments will take advantage of the fact that students in the programs will be acting as the teacher of record in a classroom while in the program. Students will have opportunities to analyze their own practice and make adjustments accordingly.
